

UNLOCKING SUCCESS WITH GROWTH PLANNING




IDEATHON

The CAT exam started in 1950 with just 300 candidates, and today, over 3 lakh students appear for it every year—making it one of India's toughest and most competitive exams!

EDITORS MEET ON WRITING QUALITY RESEARCH PAPERS

Date: 7th February 2025

Jaypee Business School (JBS), JIIT Sector-62, organized an online Editors' Meet on Writing Quality Research Papers on February 7, 2025. The session featured distinguished speakers including Prof. Brandon Randolph-Seng (Texas A&M University, Editor: Management Decision), Dr. Narendra Kumar Sahoo (Senior Scientist, CSIR Delhi, Editor: Journal of Scientific & Industrial Research), Dr. Neelam Rani (Associate Professor, IIM Shillong, Editor: IIMS Journal of Management Science), and Prof. Sumit Narula (Professor & Director, Amity University Gurgaon, Editor: Journal of Content, Community & Communication).

The workshop aimed to provide valuable insights into writing and publishing high-quality research papers. Prof. Brandon Randolph-Seng explained the key steps to successfully publishing in Q1 journals, emphasizing originality, rigorous methodology, clear presentation of results, and meticulous adherence to author guidelines.

Dr. Neelam Rani highlighted the importance of a well-structured manuscript with originality, strong theoretical foundations, robust analysis, and ethical research practices, along with alignment to the journal's scope. Prof. Sumit Narula shared practical tips on identifying and verifying quality journals through indexing, impact factors, peer-review status, and editorial boards.

Dr. Narendra Kumar Sahoo elaborated on the submission requirements and ethical standards for publishing in the Journal of Scientific and Industrial Research, stressing clarity, scientific rigor, and proper formatting. The event concluded with an engaging Q&A session where participants' queries were addressed by the editors, making the workshop highly insightful and enriching for researchers and academicians.

Date: 23rd September - 4th October 2024



Spanning 40 hours, the program was coordinated by Dr. Sapna Yadav and Dr. Richa Chauhan with the aim of equipping students with industry-relevant technological skills. The sessions were delivered by Ms. Chandni, M.Tech in Computer Science and Engineering (University Gold Medalist), currently serving as a Project Engineer at CDAC Noida.

With extensive expertise in Big Data, Data Science, Artificial Intelligence, and Machine Learning, she has conducted numerous for training programs government organizations and academic institutions India. provided The bootcamp across participants with both theoretical knowledge practical exposure, helping them and understand emerging technologies and their real-world applications.

NUANCES OF INTERNATIONAL TRADING

27th February 2025

The lecture covered key aspects of India's export process. It highlighted major industries, government support, and challenges like regulatory compliance, logistics, and financial risks. The session explained shipping bills—essential export documents—and their types.

In addition, the session outlined the registration stages required to become an exporter in India. This included a step-by-step explanation of obtaining an Importer-Exporter Code (IEC), which serves as a mandatory license for engaging in international trade, along with other related registrations that help businesses participate in the global marketplace.



Did you know?

Before any business can start exporting from India, it must obtain an Importer-Exporter Code (IEC) from the Directorate General of Foreign Trade (DGFT)—without it, no goods can legally leave the country. Shipping bills, the most crucial export documents, come in different types depending on the nature of the goods and are mandatory for customs clearance.

The discussion also emphasized the importance of registering with the Directorate General of Foreign Trade (DGFT). It provided participants with a practical understanding of export procedures, regulatory requirements, and strategic considerations that businesses must be aware of while expanding globally.

- Take advantage of expert guidance from EducationUSA centers, which offer credible, no-cost resources for every stage of the application and visa process.
- Research thoroughly to choose the right universities based on academic and personal goals and be mindful of varying application deadlines across institutions.


